Newell Lavell Snow, 84, of Jensen died May 17, 1983 in the Ashley Medical Center.

He was born in Jensen, Feb. 9, 1899, the second son of Albert and Rebecca Snow. He married Alice Collett Snow May 29, 1919 in the Salt Lake LDS Temple.

He attended school at Jensen and the Wasatch Academy. At sixteen, Newell was a full-fledge range rider, and his skill with a rope, an overhand throwing style, made him a favorite when there was roping to be done. He was a rancher in the Jensen and Blue Mountain area.

He is survived by a son, Merrill G. Snow of Jensen and a daughter, Jennie Snow Merriam of Meeker, Colo. He was preceded in death by two sons, Orin Snow of Rawlins, Wyo. and Edgar Snow.

Local resident dies May 2

Alice (Collett) Snow, 92, died May 2, 1990 at the Uintah Care Center.

She was born October 11, 1897 in Vernal to Sylvanus and Sarah Elizabeth (Simkins) Collett. She married Newell LaVell Snow May 29, 1919 in the Salt Lake L.D.S. Temple.

She was a homemaker and member of the Jensen Second Ward serving as President of the Primary, President of the Relief Society for eight years and six years in the YWMA Presidency. She served twenty eight years on the Uintah County Welfare Board, nineteen of those as chairwoman. She was a member of the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers, Camp Escalante since it was organized in Jensen. She enjoyed doing handiwork, quilting and the beauty of her home and flowers was shared by all.

Alice is preceded in death by her husband, Newell LaVell Snow; two infant sons, Edger Snow and Orin L. Snow; three brothers, Wylie Collett, Byron Collett and Orin Collett; sister, Mrs. Edith Hatch.

She is survived by a son, Meril G. Snow of Jensen; a daughter, Mrs. Dewayne (Jennie) Merriam of Mecker, Colo.; 18 grandchildren; 38 great grandchildren; two brothers, Howard Collett of Lapoint and Carl Collett of Greendale, Utah; sister, Edna (Collett) Raines of Vernal; daughter-in-law, Joyce Snow of Encampment, Wyo.

Funeral services were held Saturday, May 5, 1990 at 11:00 a.m. at the Jensen Second Ward Chapel with Bishop Larry Peterson conducting. The family prayer was given by Howard Collett. Prelude and Postlude music was played by Lorin Merriam. There was a musical "O What Songs Of The Heart", by Sylvia Slaugh, Addie Snow, Cathy Snow and Mary Ann Snow. The invocation was given by Wade Slaugh. Bishop Larry Peterson gave some remarks, followed by Carl Collett who spoke. "Rock, Alone In An Old Rocking Chair" was then sung by Leo Snow followed by Mary Lee Casperson who spoke. The congregation then sang "God Be With You Til We Meet Again". The benediction was given by Meril Snow.

Jensen resident spends life-time running cattle on Blue Mountain

The following is one in a series of articles honoring ranchers in this area who are members of the Uintah Cattlemen's Association and who have passed their 80th milestone. Honorary lifetime memberships have been awarded these men by the association.

Eighty-two years in the saddle can make a heap of memories and Newell L. Snow of Jensen has stored up a lot of them. During his years in the cattle business he has seen a three year seige of Mormon Crickets, drought, gully washers and progress.

Newell was born February 9, 1899 in Jensen, the second son of Albert and Rebecca Snow. He attended school at Jensen and the Wasatch Academy, enjoyed swimming and a good fishing stream. He married Alice Collett May 29, 1919 in the Salt Lake LDS Temple. They are parents of four children, Mrs. DeWayne (Jennie) Merriam, Meril G., Orin L., who died December 29, 1960, and a son, Edgar, who died at birth.

Albert Snow and his brother, Hugh, known miles around as the "Snow Brothers", came into the Uintah Basin in 1885. They acquired a herd of cattle and located on the west end of Blue Mountain in 1898. There were no running streams and so they did it the hard way...they built reservoirs. Earth fills in every coulee that looked like it might hold water. One of their reservoirs, the Stuntz, is still a landmark on the mountain today.

At sixteen, Newell was a full-fledged range rider, and his skill with a rope in an overhand throwing style, made him a favorite when there was roping to be done. Most of his time was spent in the company of other cowboys on Blue.

After World War I, the Homestead Act opened many acres of land to the public and Newell filed on 640 acres in the Stuntz Valley. In the spring of 1930 he moved his family to the mountain where they made their home for the next seven summers. His wife Alice recalls those trips by team and wagon.

"The road, if you could call it that, sure didn't look like it does today. Sometimes on a steep haul, the team would 'fly back' and that put your heart in your mouth. I had to make sure I had enough supplies to last until we came down again too. You sure didn't go running to the store every day! I'd take fresh vegetables and fruit and do my winter canning. Hard as they were, they were good years."

The spring roundups were the high spot of the season. Riders came from Rangely on the south, Elk Springs to

the east, and Harpers Corner on the north.

Each man had at least three horses and some extra. At times there would be nearly two hundred head in the cavy. The herd was driven by horse wranglers separate from the cattle and herded into a temporary enclosure made by the wagons being placed in a box shape and ropes tied to steel pegs driven into the ground. After the horses were driven in, the fourth side was closed. If a cowboy needed to get one of his own horses out, he could do so only if he could rope the horse without swinging the rope above his head. To do otherwise would stampede the bunch out of the makeshift corral and there'd be the devil to pay gathering them up again. Because of Newell's accuracy and the quiet way his rope snaked over the head of a bronc, he was asked by the boss of the cavy to catch a good many mounts. The horses were herded night and day and brought into camp morning, noon and night so each rider could saddle a fresh one. It was a must that a fresh horse be tied near where the owner slept in case of stampede.

Early mornings a saddle didn't set too well on some of the old ponies, joked Newell, and we usually had some excitement around breakfast time.

Meril tells of his Dad's last trip on a buckner. "Dad had saddled this big, green, bay gelding and he bogged his head and built to it right through some old time mowing machines and wagons...Dad had to stay on. Then that old horse headed out toward the highway with Dad quirting him every jump. Dad built to him clear to the old airport in the Clay Hills. When Ross caught up,

Dad was still workin' on him."

One trip to Craig, Colorado Newell was responsible for the chuckwagon and camp. One a.m. before the cock crowed, Johnny Evans, just foolin', woke Newell with a rousing, "Time for breakfast!"

Shaking sleep from his eyes, Newell retorted, "Time for breakfast! It ain't even 1 o'clock!" But he got up and cooked it. Johnny sez' "Woah!, you don't expect me to eat now do ya?" "You're the one said it was time for breakfast," snorted Newell, "Now eat it!"...and Johnny did.

In 1934-35 Blue Mountain was so dry the lizards were panting and Newell dug a well by hand. He set up an inch pump and watered every head of stock on Blue. Alice said that when that pump started gushing, cattle, horses and even the deer, came from every direction.

The life style of the cowboys changed as fences began to appear on what used to be open range and it became harder for the cattlemen to trail their herds to market. In the early 1930's J. J. Statton started trucking cattle to Craig on his return trips from deliveries to the gilsonite mines. There the beeves boarded the stock cars for Denver.

Albert Snow and his sons dissolved partnership with each one taking their own ranch and cattle business.

Again Newell and Alice spent a lot of time riding the slopes of Blue together. In 1964, due to ill health, Newell leased his land and cattle to Meril. May 29th of this year, he and Alice celebrated 62 years of togetherness.

A life of productivity can be summed up in this tribute from his son. Said Meril, "You wouldn't find Dad at the conventions and dance halls, but where the work was..."
